

A Message From the CEO & Board Chair





Dear Friends of LifeSource,

This past year challenged, compelled and transformed us in countless ways. After a record-breaking 2019, LifeSource entered 2020 energized and ready to continue that momentum.

Then, March arrived; and with it, the dark clouds of COVID-19. The pandemic impacted every part of our work. We saw DMV offices close, events canceled, tissue and eye donation paused and in-hospital work adjusted. Yet, our mission had to continue. The transplant wait list was growing; more men, women and children counted on us for a second chance.

So, this dedicated team found a path forward:

- We tested every potential donor for COVID-19; active positive results immediately disqualified them, yet we kept our donation rate high.
- Our partners offered N-95 masks so we could continue being on the ground in donor hospitals.
- We supported more than 1,000 grieving donor families over the phone and on Zoom when meeting in-person wasn't possible.
- · We advocated in different ways through virtual events, videos and digital media.

When so much felt out of our control, when the days and circumstances left us discouraged and overwhelmed, saving and healing lives through organ, eye and tissue donation served as a bright spot – a respite from the rain.

We couldn't stop the storm of COVID-19. But like an umbrella, each one of you – our partners and supporters – allowed us to move through the rain and achieve near record numbers.

What Lies Ahead: LifeSource Bold Aims

The challenges of 2020 demonstrated that the LifeSource team can do hard things, overcome obstacles and achieve the impossible.

With that, we've set two Bold Aims for LifeSource moving forward:

More Lives

1,000 transplants from local donors in 2027



Reflecting the diversity of our community by 2025. Achieving equity in communities of color saying "yes" to donation by 2030.



Our Commitment to the Community

For more than 30 years, our LifeSource family has worked with our region's diverse communities to break down barriers to donation and transplantation. We are proud that, in 2014, we intentionally decided to relocate to North Minneapolis to create a home for donation and a space where we could be part of the community and share the gift of life to North Minneapolis.

Our work at LifeSource lives in the space between life and death. We value and respect life and believe that all life is a gift.

After the murder of George Floyd in May 2020, the LifeSource community was compelled to take further action to combat racial injustice and support our neighbors and community. These commitments include:

- DONATE RESOURCES and support to our neighbors dedicated to eradicating racism and rebuilding our community. Our first step is to make a significant contribution to West Broadway Business and Area Coalition, whose mission is to transform the Northside into a thriving economic community.
- STRENGTHEN OUR CAREER pipeline for healthcare professionals of color. LifeSource has a summer internship program and has worked with partners to prepare students for career readiness. We will continue these programs and look for opportunities to expand them.
- PROVIDE A PLATFORM and space for listening, learning and action.

- STAND WITH DIVERSE
 communities for today, tomorrow
 and in the future. One of our
 strategic priorities is to strengthen
 service to and engagement with
 these diverse communities and
 ensure they are represented in
 our resources and materials.
- EXAMINE OUR POLICIES, recruitment, programs and initiatives with a more equitable and inclusive lens.
- COMMUNICATE REGULARLY with our team and increase our equity and inclusion education and our professional development opportunities and resources.
- OUR PURSUIT OF EQUITY will continue to be a focus in the years ahead.

Numbers

Like many organizations, LifeSource experienced a variety of challenges due to the pandemic. We did see the total number of potential donors decline, especially during the stay-at-home orders.

Eye donation also significantly decreased while elective surgeries were on hold.

Beginning in summer 2020, we saw donation activity slowly return to more normal levels.

Despite every conceivable obstacle, the number of organ donations and transplants hit near-record levels in the Upper Midwest in 2020: 185 donors and 603 lives saved.








LifeSource Launches New Website

LifeSource launched a new website in January 2020 with an improved user experience, a video to explain how donation works and a flexible blog platform to tell our own stories. We had no idea at the time how valuable that tool would become as we shifted to online events and electronic community engagement throughout 2020.











New Videos:

Donor & Recipients' Stories

That's one of the struggles [having end of life discussions], particularly in the African American community. Don't leave that decision to the person who survives. It didn't take me a year to come to the decision that the decision I made was the wrong one. It was literally days.

In 2020, LifeSource developed six new video stories to encourage our community to register as organ, eye and tissue donors and strengthen community support for organ, eye and tissue donation.

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HEN WE THINK ABOUT the journey to adulthood – getting a driver's license is a key milestone.

Wyatt, a Minnesota teen, waited until he turned 18 to get his first license. But, like everything else, the pandemic delayed his road test. In late July 2020, Wyatt finally sat behind the wheel.

"I was holding my breath," said his grandmother, Jan. "But he passed."

Just two months after getting his license, in September 2020, then 19-year-old Wyatt was lying in the hospital with non-survivable injuries.

Hospital staff did all they could to save Wyatt's life. When there was nothing left, they called LifeSource.

LifeSource conducted medical assessments and checked the organ donor registry. Wyatt had checked the "donor" box when he got his license just two months earlier.

Due to the way Wyatt passed away, typically donation of his heart would not have been possible. But Wyatt had a unique opportunity. He became the first person in the upper Midwest to donate a heart as part of a U.S. trial of the TransMedics Organ Care System (OCS). This technology can increase the number of hearts available for transplant and offer more families the chance to give the gift of their loved one's organs.

The OCS is transformative technology, nourishing organs in a state that mimics the human body, OCS can give transplant teams the potential to improve post-transplant outcomes and save more lives. Hearts placed on the Organ Care System have been transplanted after as long as sixteen hours. With a traditional transplant, the recovered heart is chilled and unable to pump oxygenated blood, leaving it more prone to deterioration or damage. These hearts remain viable for only six hours.

In this country, more than 3,500 people are on the waiting list for a new heart. The majority are in their 50s and early 60s, and most have severe, debilitating heart failure. But because of a shortage of suitable donor hearts, fewer than half will



receive a heart transplant. However, an emerging technique known as donation after circulatory death may help address that gap in coming years.

Thanks to Wyatt and his family's generosity, the heart recipient is thriving.


Wyatt's family has found healing in knowing Wyatt's legacy of helping others lives on.

Without this technology, Wyatt's heart donation would not have been possible.


About the DCD Heart Clinical Trials & Organ Care System

In this country, more than 3,500 people are on the waiting list for a new heart. But because of a shortage of suitable donor hearts, fewer than half will receive a heart transplant. TransMedics: The Organ Care System (OCS™) designed by the Massachusetts-based company, is a revolutionary technology for preserving organs. The OCS acts as a miniature intensive care unit that keeps organs alive and healthy by preserving them in a natural state that mimics the human body, so organs can remain viable for transplant along the way to recipients.

Donation After Brain Death vs. Circulatory Death (DCD)

Historically, hearts and other organs used in transplants have come from people who experience a serious trauma, such as a car accident, gunshot wound, or massive stroke. If they have no detectable brain activity, they are considered brain dead.

Others in similar circumstances may not meet the strict criteria for brain death: they have a devastating brain injury with no chance of recovery but may still have some involuntary reflexes. If the person's family decides to withdraw life-sustaining measures, and the person's heart stops beating within a certain window of time, death is declared. Donors may then have their organs recovered, known as donation after circulatory death (or DCD). But hearts are particularly vulnerable to injury, so they don't function reliably well after conventional DCD. The new Organ Care System helps solve that problem.

Hearts placed on the Organ Care System have been transplanted after as long as sixteen hours.

Traditional cold storage hearts are only viable for a maximum of 6 hours.

Two Honor Walks Held at the LifeSource Office

In January 2020, LifeSource staff had two opportunities to line our sidewalk and honor service members who healed lives through tissue and eye donation. First a police officer, then a fire chief were escorted from the LifeSource recovery facility to a funeral home.


